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1 Introduction

- 1.1.1 Table 1.1 below represents a gazetteer of known Historic environment sites and finds within the study area. Each entry has a Gazetteer ID number. The gazetteer should be read in conjunction with Appendix 8.1: Archaeological and historical baseline (Figure 1 and Figure 2) which show the location of heritage assets listed in this gazetteer.
- 1.1.2 Those assets which lie within the extent of the draft Order limits are assigned 'Assessment 1' numbers, e.g. **A1a, A1b, A1c** etc). Thereafter, assets within the wider study area are numbered sequentially (e.g. **A2, A3, A4** and so forth).
- 1.1.3 For the purposes of the preliminary assessment presented in PEI Report Chapter 8: Historic environment the individual receptors have been grouped and assigned a PEIR Area ID, as referred to in Appendix 8.2: Designated assets and non-designated built heritage assets – statements of significance (which are omitted in this gazetteer).
- 1.1.4 Table 1.2 contains the list of past archaeological investigations (HER Events) within the 1km study area. These are not assigned an assessment Gazetteer ID number and are referred to by their unique HER event ID (e.g. EOXXXXX).
